

His Elephant & Piggie early reader series has been rewarded two Theodor Seuss Geisel Medals, and five Geisel Honors. Mo Willems started his career as a Sesame Street writer and animator, garnering six Emmy Awards in his time.

- Piggie is invited to a party hosted by the Squirrelles and gets to bring Gerald. They do not know what kind of party they are going to attend. What is your favorite kind of party? Write about what your dream party would be like!
- Piggie is SO excited to show Gerald her new toy, but has trouble letting Gerald look at it and take a turn. Think about your favorite toy and list at least three reasons why it is your favorite. Then write about the best way to share your toy with your friends!



Critical Thinking Activity: Cause & Effect

In a cause and effect relationship, one event leads another to happen. The cause is why it happened, and the effect is what happened.

On one side of this page is the "cause" column. The other side is the "effect" column.
